KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE TOGETHER

Held annually on the **last Friday of October, Day for Daniel** is Australia's largest child safety education and awareness event. The purpose is to reinforce the vital message that **keeping kids safe** is a responsibility we all share—**parents, carers, educators, businesses...the entire community.**

The focus for schools this year is creating safe spaces in physical and online environments for children and young people. There will be more information coming home from your child's teacher closer to Oct 31st.

ANAPHYLAXIS AND ASTHMA

We have several children enrolled who suffer from severe allergies to a variety of things including nuts and nut products, dairy & wheat, which can result in them going into anaphylactic shock. Anaphylaxis is the most severe form of allergic reaction and is potentially life threatening. It must be treated as a medical emergency, requiring immediate treatment and urgent medical attention.

At Quarry Hill, several strategies are in place to deal with this. We are an Allergy Aware school. Students are encouraged to wash hands before and after eating to minimise the risk of contamination. Often boxes and packages are sent to school for art construction activities and are very useful. However, do not send any packages for use at school that have contained dairy, wheat, nuts, or nut products, so that we can minimise the risk of children with allergies coming into contact with products that may cause a reaction.

Action Plans for Anaphylaxis and also for Asthma are required for all children who suffer from either and must be obtained from the family doctor. Please ensure that your child has an updated plan if they suffer from Asthma or are at risk of experiencing Anaphylaxis. A copy of this plan must be provided to the school immediately.

THUNDERSTORM ASTHMA- BE PREPARED THIS POLLEN SEASON

Grass pollen season, which typically runs from October to December each year in Victoria, brings an increase in asthma and hay fever symptoms. It also increases the risk of thunderstorm asthma. For people with asthma or hay fever, especially those who experience wheezing or coughing with their hay fever, thunderstorm asthma can be sudden, serious, and even life threatening.

Quarry Hill Primary School will implement a range of measures to keep our school community safe as the risk of thunderstorm asthma increases. Many of our staff are trained in asthma first aid. We will monitor the VicEmergency app to receive thunderstorm warnings and, where appropriate, keep students indoors when weather forecasts identify greater risk.

During the season, there are some things you can do to prepare and protect yourself and your family:

- If your child has ever had asthma, talk to your doctor about what you can do to help protect them from the risk of thunderstorm asthma this pollen season, including updating your asthma action plan. Taking an asthma preventer properly and regularly is key to preventing asthma, including thunderstorm asthma.
- If your child has hay fever, see your pharmacist or doctor for a hay fever treatment plan and check if you should have an asthma reliever puffer. These are available from a pharmacy without a prescription.
- If your child has hay fever and experiences wheezing and coughing, it is important to make sure they don't also have asthma. Speak to your doctor about an asthma action plan.

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Where possible, avoid being outside during thunderstorms from October to December, especially during
the wind gusts that come before the storm. Go inside and close your doors and windows. If you have your
air conditioning on, turn it to 'recirculate'.

Even if your child has mild Asthma, it is essential that their medication and spacer (and a compatible face mask if under 5 years old) are always available to school staff. Please ensure your child's puffer and spacer are in their bag each day.

Protect yourself this pollen season – managing asthma and allergies matters.

PARKING AROUND THE SCHOOL

Parents are reminded that it is essential to comply with parking restrictions when dropping off and collecting children from school. Motorists must not stop in no stopping areas, even briefly, with or without the motor running. They must not stop next to a continuous yellow edge line, on nature strips, too close to school crossings, park over driveways double park. At our school, we have short term time restricted areas, the 2-minute parks. These parking areas are in place to allow for ease of access close to schools and these restrictions must be adhered to. Drivers should also be aware that they cannot perform a U-turn over an unbroken or continuous dividing line and please watch out and slow down for children crossing the road and around school buses, a reminder that the speed limit around schools is 40. With regard to children's crossings, the law requires that a driver approaching a children's crossing must drive at a speed at which the driver can, if necessary, stop safely before the crossing. Please slow down and take extra care when driving in school zones. City of Greater Bendigo Parking Officers and Bendigo Police do conduct random patrols throughout the school year at various locations to ensure that motorists are adhering to the Road Rules.

Our delicious mangoes are grown in sunny north QLD, just south of Townsville.

Our Mango Fundraiser proudly features Bowen Special Mangoes, more formally known as Kensington Pride Mangoes. Each tray is carefully packed in a single layer, weighing around 7kg and holding 12-23 mangoes, depending on the fruit size.

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In our classrooms, the first few minutes of the day are devoted to our morning circle. We gather together, seated in a way that allows everyone to see each other and feel included. This is more than just a friendly chat; it's an important part of our wellbeing and learning routine.

Morning circles are a core strategy from the Berry Street Education Model (BSEM), which focuses on building strong, safe, and supportive classroom communities. They help us start the day with connection, predictability, and a calm, positive mindset; key ingredients for effective learning.

During a morning circle, we might:

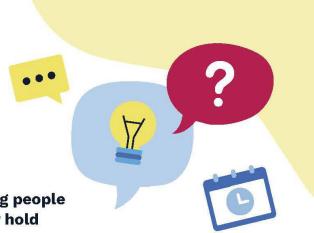
- Share a greeting to acknowledge each person.
- Check in on how we're feeling that day.
- Play a short, energising or calming activity.
- Talk about what's ahead and set shared goals.

These moments aren't just nice—they serve an important purpose. By slowing down to connect before diving into lessons, students can regulate their emotions, strengthen relationships with classmates and teachers, and build trust in the learning environment.

The BSEM reminds us that connection comes before curriculum—and morning circles are one way we make that happen every single day.

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Social media age restrictions



What you need to know

From 10 December 2025 Australian young people under 16 will not be allowed to create or hold accounts on certain social media platforms.

Delaying account access allows more time for young people to build digital literacy and greater resilience.

How will it work?

Under the law, the responsibility lies with the age-restricted platforms to find and deactivate existing accounts held by under-16s and to prevent under-16s from creating new accounts.

There are no penalties for under-16s who access an age-restricted social media platform, or for their parents or carers.

Social media platforms

Online services are constantly evolving but at this stage the restrictions are likely to apply to **Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, TikTok, X (formerly Twitter) and YouTube,** among other platforms.

Online gaming and standalone messaging apps are among a number of types of services that have been excluded under the legislative rules.

Teens will still have online access

Under-16s will still be able to see publicly available social media content that doesn't require being logged into an account. For example, most content is currently available to view on YouTube without holding an account.

Having an account increases the likelihood that they'll be exposed to pressures and risks stemming from design features which encourage children to spend more time on screens, while serving up content that can harm their health and wellbeing.

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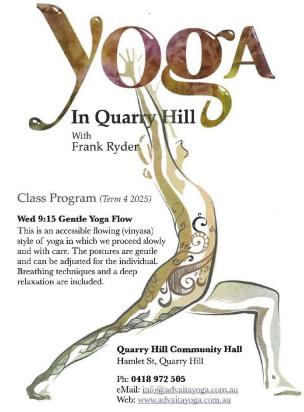
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
