New Maths Curriculum

The Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA) recently published its revised mathematics curriculum (Mathematics Curriculum 2.0).

All Victorian Government schools will start using the Mathematics Curriculum 2.0 in 2024 or 2025. At Quarry Hill Primary School we are using the revised mathematics curriculum for school reporting from Semester 1 2025.


On your child's previous report, the teacher reported against the 3 strands of the achievement standard for Mathematics (Number and Algebra, Measurement and Geometry, and Statistics and Probability). Under the Mathematics Curriculum 2.0, your child's teacher will report against the achievement standard as a whole, providing a single, aggregated score.

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As the achievement standards reported on have changed, your child's Semester 1 report will only show achievement and not progress. For all reports after this, progress will be shown against the single achievement standard.

Work Habits

Student work habits relate to student effort and behaviour. They are gauged using the scale of Rarely, Sometimes, Usually, and Consistently.



Teacher Comment

Teacher comments highlight personal learning characteristics, personal qualities and elaborate on student work habits. This is the focus of the Semester One reports.

Specialist Subjects

Specialist teachers provide an overview of tasks completed throughout the semester. They assess students' work habits.

Continuous Reporting & Learning Tasks

Continuous reporting is the process whereby teachers throughout the teaching and learning cycle provide feedback to students regarding their learning progress.

Feedback is timelier, supports students to more effectively track, reflect and improve their learning and supports parents/carers to develop a greater awareness of, and engagement with, their child's learning progress and achievement.

Parents/Carers do not have to wait to have conversations with teachers about any issues or concerns.

As part of our continuous reporting cycle, all students at our school undertake learning tasks throughout the year. Learning tasks are activities that have been completed in class and assessed against the Victorian Curriculum by teachers.

The tasks are uploaded onto Compass regularly throughout the term and are from a variety of subject areas. Parents/Carers and children are encouraged to access the tasks when they are uploaded and discuss them together.

Attendance

Student attendance is included and shows the number of days absent for the semester.

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Some Frequently Asked Questions

What does the 5-point scale with the dot points represent?

Student reports use a five-point rating scale to show student progress and achievement, at the time of reporting.


Teachers enter a score based on their judgement of each student's level of achievement against the curriculum areas taught during the reporting period.

Why is there such a big or small spread between the dots on the scales?

Reporting reflects what has been taught. For example, English, Mathematics and Physical Education are all subjects that are taught all year and are reported against twice a year. The dot points on the scale reflect this 6-month time span, hence the line (growth) is shorter.



Some other subjects, such as History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship, for example, are curriculum areas that are managed on a two-year cycle. This means that those subjects may not be taught every semester, or indeed, every year. The dot points on the scale will either have no previous dot (as this is the first time the subject has been taught),



or it will have a longer line between the dots (as it may be 12 months or more since the subject was taught).



Why hasn't my child moved on the scale from their last report?

Like physical growth spurts, children learn at different rates. Sometimes they make rapid progression with their learning and may then need time to consolidate before their next learning growth. Other children might learn at a slower, but more continuous rate.

Everyone is different.

Children will never progress as rapidly as they do in the early stages of their life. (In the first few years, more than 1 million new neural connections are formed every second!)

As children progress through stages in their education their thinking becomes more abstract. They move from the 'known' (which is what is in front of them or the experiences that they have lived) to broader and more unfamiliar concepts.

Learning becomes more about expanding their education and applying their new knowledge and skills rather than just going up levels.

What are Student Led Conferences?

Student Led conferences are a special opportunity for students to take the lead in sharing their learning. Reflecting our school values of Kind, Curious, and Brave, students will showcase work they're proud of, reflect on their growth, and share their goals.

Our upcoming conferences will be held on Wednesday 25th June. Appointments can be made via our Compass portal, with bookings opening on Monday 16th June.

Parents/Carers are required to attend with their child for the 15-minute timeslot chosen on this day. Students will not be attending school other than their conference time but are asked to wear their school uniform to their session.

The back of the certificate will show your child's ICAS results and the login details, "TAP ID and Pin". - Use these to enter the Results Portal.

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Spotlight on Teaching and Learning: Writing

This week we continue our Spotlight on Teaching and Learning, where we will share our teaching and learning practices at QHPS.

At our school, we use a structured approach to teaching writing. The Writing Rope model highlights five key areas that help children become confident and effective writers. Writing is also used as a strategy to improve readign comprehension. Below is a snapshot of these areas, along with examples of how they are taught in the classroom

Summarising key ideas in their own words, taking notes to organise important information, answering questions to reflect on meaning, using new vocabulary to reinforce learning and exploring grammar and sentence structures to recognise how language shapes

Writing to Improve Reading Comprehension

Writing about what they read helps students deepen their understanding of a text. This can include:

meaning

Syntax (Sentence Structu & Grammar)

This focuses on how sentences are put together. Children learn about punctuation, grammar, and different sentence types to make their writing clear and engaging

In the classroom: Students highlight different types of sentences in a model text (e.g., statement, command, question). They then practise rewriting sentences to improve clarity and variety.

Transcription (Handwriting, Spelling &

Critical Thinking (Ideas &

Purpose)

Children learn to plan their writing,

think about their audience and

organise their ideas clearly.

In the classroom: Before starting a persuasive piece, students discuss

the topic, brainstorm reasons, and

decide how to convince their

reader. They use graphic organisers

to plan their writing.

Strong writing also depends on practical skills like handwriting, spelling, and typing. When children can write fluently and spell correctly, they can focus more on their ideas and creativity.

In the classroom: Younger students work on correct letter formation, hile older students learn efficien typina skills.

Vriting Craft (Word Choice 8 Style)

This area focuses on making writing interesting and expressive. Children learn to use descriptive words, varied sentence beginnings, and different writing techniques to engage their readers.

In the classroom: Students revise a piece of descriptive writing by adding adjectives, similes, and stronger verbs. They might compare "The cat an" with "The sleek black cat darted through the alley" to see the difference.

Text Structure (Organisation of Writing)

Students learn how different types of writing are structured. Understanding these structures helps them communicate their ideas effectively.

In the classroom: When writing a narrative, students map out their introduction, problem, climax, and resolution before drafting. They check their work to ensure it follows this structure.

Update your apps and devices

Updating your apps and devices can fix issues and address new security concerns or weaknesses that hackers could use to access your devices or accounts. They can also add new features.



Turn on multi-factor authentication (MFA)

MFA means having more than one check in place to prove your identity on an account. For example, you may need a code from a text message and your passphrase. It makes it much harder for cybercriminals to access your accounts.



Set up and perform regular backups

A backup is a digital copy of your most important information either to an external storage device or a server on the internet like the cloud. It means you can restore your files if something goes wrong.



Set up secure passphrases

When MFA is not available, use a passphrase to secure your account. A passphrase is a strong type of password that uses four or more random words. This makes them hard for cybercriminals to guess but easy for you to remember.



Recognise and report scams

Criminals often use email, SMS, phone calls and social media to scam people. They usually do this by contacting you and pretending to be an individual or organisation you know and trust.

Always be alert when clicking on attachments or links within emails or messages.
