Our launch of our revitalised Bushland space is scheduled for this Friday morning, November 15th, at 10.00am. We would love to have as many of our community as possible come and join us. We

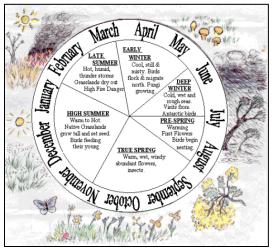

REMEMBRANCE DAY



Monday, November 11th, was Remembrance Day. At 11:00am we paused as a school for a minute's silence to remember those who died or suffered for Australia's cause in all wars and armed conflict.

As with other years, we have sold RSL poppies, pins and bracelets to support the RSL. Interestingly, poppies were first sold in Australia in 1921 and continue to be sold by the RSL in the lead up to Remembrance Day every year to raise the much needed funds for the organisation's valuable welfare work.

We are always happy to support this worthwhile cause.

COLOUR RUN – FUNDRAISING FOR NEW PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT

As many of you would be aware, part of our yellow playground was removed recently as it was deemed unsafe to continue using. It is a huge disappointment to all of us, and especially for our younger students who love the challenge that this type of equipment brings. We know that children need to be able to access playground equipment to develop physically and that physical activity during playtime helps them to relax and settle to learn.

As you would probably appreciate, playground equipment is very expensive to purchase. It is also expensive to install and have the surrounding area prepared to a safe standard. Our target is to raise \$25,000.00 for this project.

2020 PREP TRANSITION REMINDER – MONDAY NOVEMBER 25TH

Just a reminder to our 2020 Prep families that we have our third transition session scheduled for Monday November 25th. The session will run from 12:45pm – 1:45pm. The children will spend time in the classroom and have an opportunity to meet their buddies for next year. Our school's buddy program is based on The Alannah and Madeline Foundation's *Better Buddies* Framework. The central goal of this program is to create friendly and caring school communities by building strong buddy relationships between students in their first year of school and students in their last years of primary school.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

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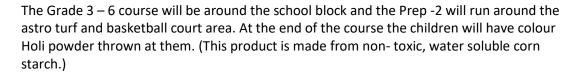
SWIMMING PROGRAM- GURRI WANYARRA WELLBEING CENTRE

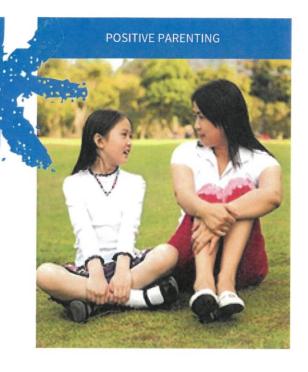

Why validation is the best parenting skill of all

At a time when the mental health and wellbeing of children and teenagers is firmly in the spotlight, validation is an essential parenting skill.

When a child or teen comes to you when they are struggling emotionally, they want you to understand their dilemma. They don't want to be dismissed or told to 'get over it'. They generally want someone to acknowledge that their concern is real with comments such as:

"I see you're worried about going to camp. I can understand that. "

"Thanks for telling about the scary monsters in your bedroom. Let's see what we can do about them."

"I'd be afraid too if I was left alone on my own for that long."

Validation of a child's struggles helps them

Validating a child's struggles helps in a number of ways. It works to:

Build deep connection

Relationships built at the time of vulnerability go deep and are hard to break.

Promote a child's wellbeing

Validation helps kids feel safe, which is what 'worry warts' and anxious kids want. Lack of understanding rather than fear itself often impacts negatively on a child's happiness.

Overcome disappointment and build resilience

Validation encourages kids to give voice to their concern or disappointment and either takes steps to rectify it or move on.

Develop emotional intelligence

Parental validation models emotional intelligence for children and teens. It requires you to identify the emotions that may be behind their language or behaviour.

Encourage empathy

Validation requires you to stop, listen and get on the same wavelength as your child.

Four steps to validating your child's emotions

Follow these steps when your child comes to you with their worries or concerns to make sure they feel understood.

Attend

Stop what you are doing and give your child full attention.

Observe

Listen with your eyes as well as your ears.

Reflect back their worries

Get down to their eye level if necessary, saying something like, "I see you're really concerned about this."

Touch

If appropriate, gently touch their shoulder or give them a hug when you speak to them. This will help them feel safe and comforted.

There's no better feeling for a child or teen who is struggling than knowing someone they value truly understands them.
