## GIRLS IN STEM (SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING AND MATHEMATICS)

Last Tuesday, our two Girls in STEM leaders, Mietta and Willow, attended their first session at the Science and Discovery Centre. It was fitting that this session coincided with the International Day of Women and Girls in Science.

At present, less than 30 per cent of researchers worldwide are women. According to UNESCO data (2014 - 2016), only around 30 per cent of all female students select STEM-

related fields in higher education. Globally, female students' enrolment is particularly low in ICT (3 per cent), natural science, mathematics and statistics (5 per cent) and in engineering, manufacturing and construction (8 per cent).

When promoting the International Day of Women and Girls in Science, the UN Secretary-General, Antonio Guterres is quoted as saying, "To rise to the challenges of the 21st century, we need to harness our full potential. That requires dismantling gender stereotypes. On this International Day of Women and Girls in Science, let's pledge to end the gender imbalance in science."

The girls met with a number of other girls from local primary schools and had the opportunity to do a variety of activities that included making slime, playing with stick insects and setting corn flour on fire! Yes, corn flour is flammable – but it will only ignite if it is dispersed in air. It was fascinating to watch.







## KITCHEN GARDEN

Our Kitchen Garden program began last week with the first group of Grade 5/6s participating in preparing and cooking a three course meal. Cucumber Gazpacho, Vegetable Frittata and Fruit Salad was on the menu. Everyone was expected to try the food, which they all did — with a number actually enjoying something new. 

## **SAFE PARKING AROUND SCHOOLS**

Parking Services from the City of Greater Bendigo have contacted our school and requested that the following information be conveyed to our school community.

The illegal parking of vehicles adjacent to our school poses a safety concern to children, pedestrians and other road users. Parents are reminded that it is essential to comply with parking restrictions when dropping off and collecting children from school.

Motorists must not stop in no stopping areas, even briefly, with or without the motor running. They must not stop next to a continuous yellow edge line, on nature strips, too close to school crossings, park over driveways or double park. A number of schools have short term time restricted areas, such as 2 minute pick up drop off. These

parking areas are in place to allow for ease of access close to schools and these restrictions must be adhered to. Drivers should also be aware that they cannot perform a U-turn over an unbroken or continuous dividing line. With regard to children's crossings, the law requires that a driver approaching a children's crossing must drive at a speed at which the driver can, if necessary stop safely before the crossing. Please slow down and take extra care when driving in school zones.

City of Greater Bendigo Parking Officers and Bendigo Police do conduct random patrols throughout the school year at various locations to ensure that motorists are adhering to the Road Rules.

## eSmart topic: Monitoring Children's Media Exposure

During the holidays, many children may have been exposed to concerning content on news and social media, such as the recent bushfire coverage. Useful tips for parents include:

- Calmly ask children what they've heard about recent news events and find out the extent of their exposure.
- Keep in mind children may have seen content which was outdated, repetitious or untrue.
- Confirm with children what really happened, keeping your language simple, honest and ageappropriate.
- Ask children how the media content makes them feel, and talk to them about what fun or soothing activities you can all do to feel better.
- Set reasonable, age-appropriate limits on media exposure.
- Help children identify news sources which are accurate and respectful.
- If children are concerned about the news, draw their attention to stories of strong, resilient
  communities and people doing good things to help make the situation better. Talk with children
  about what steps you can all take to help, such as raising money, volunteering and writing 'thank
  you' messages to the fire-fighters.

## **HEAD LICE**

Head lice are extremely contagious, and kids are the most susceptible this season... Did you know that 95% of lice are transmitted through close contact?

Head lice do not hop, jump or fly and can only be transmitted from one person to another by either close head to head contact through sharing of objects such as hats, clothing, ribbons, head bands or pillows.

Head Lice Prevention is key!
7 Crucial Steps to Keep Your School
Head Lice Free:

- 1. Check hair regularly
- 2. Avoid sharing clothing: especially hats, ribbons, head bands and helmets
- 3. Discourage children from playing with each other's hair

- 4. Don't share brushes, combs, towels and pillows
- 5. Keep long hair plaited or firmly tied back to prevent contact from other kids
- 6. Use a pesticide free Head Lice Defence Spray.
- 7. If lice infestations does occur, apply a treatment product from a Rapid or Medicated range as directed.



## **FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE**

## INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

# CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

## HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2019, you do not need to complete an application form in 2020 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.


You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools in 2020 or you did not apply in 2019.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2020.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.



# Managing separation anxiety at school drop-offs



Going to school for most children is a positive experience however some children can struggle making the transition from their home environment to school. It's naturally distressing to see your child upset at school drop-off but there is a great deal you can do to make school drop-offs easier for you and your child.

## Breaking the cycle of separation anxiety at school

A child's clinginess, crying or tantrums at school drop-off can be disturbing for you as a parent. Despite putting on a brave face, you can feel guilty that somehow you're the cause of this behaviour. Unless something traumatic has occurred then leaving your child at school is a normal part of life, something your child will get used to. The following strategies may help eradicate your child's tears and fears when you take them to school:

### Tell the story

Prepare your child thoroughly each morning for what will happen when you leave your child at school. Repeat the story each morning before school so they can fully prepare for drop-off.

### It takes two

Involve your child's teacher in the drop-off process as they will be the person who must deal with an upset child. In extreme examples, at the start of term or after a long absence, a later starting time may give your child a chance to say goodbye in more relaxed circumstances.

## Give me five

Rituals are both personal and reassuring so develop a special goodbye ritual that you consistently use when you leave your child each morning. Your special ritual may be simple such as a special wave or kiss, or fun such as a high five, low five, fist pump bursting into a hand explosion. Then leave quickly without stalling or looking back. Avoid making leaving a bigger deal than it what it is.

### Reduce the rush

Is your child a morning star or night owl? Many children are slow starters in the morning, which can mean that they're frequently rushed and arrive at school in highly anxious states. Do all you can to reduce morning stress, which may include earlier bed and waking times; laying out school clothes the previous evening and making minimal demands on their time.

Location carries memory so choose carefully the place you say goodbye to your child. If a kiss or hug at the school-gate means a happy child, then you've probably found your goodbye place. Experiment with your goodbye location until you find one that works.

### It's your job

If goodbyes continue to cause tears, tantrums or clinginess consider, if possible, saying goodbye to your child at home and allowing another adult – your partner or another parent – to take your child to school.

## If separation anxiety continues

If your child's separation anxiety interferes with their concentration and learning, prevents them from making friends, is excessive and goes longer than a month, consider getting professional support. Separation anxiety left unchecked can lead to school refusal and other anxiety disorders later on.
